Learning goals

In partnership with the adult, children will

- explore their environment and use new physical skills
- 2 demonstrate a growing understanding of themselves and others
- 3 develop an understanding of change as part of their lives
- Iearn about the natural environment and their own responsibility as carers
- 6 develop a sense of time, shape, space, and place
- nderstand concepts such as matching. sorting, size, height, capacity, and money.

Children will make sense of the world around them.

Aim 2

Children will use skills and strategies for learning about their world.

Learning goals

In partnership with the adult, children will

- nake connections between new learning and what they already know
- 2 gather and use information from different sources
- explore and develop working theories about how the world works
- demonstrate their ability to reason. negotiate and think logically
- collaborate with others to share interests and to solve problems
- use their creativity and imagination to solve problems.

Learning goals

In partnership with the adult, children will

- n demonstrate growing confidence in being able to do things themselves
- 2 address challenges and cope with frustrations
- 3 make decisions and take increasing responsibility for their own learning
- feel confident that their ideas and questions will be listened to
- develop higher-order thinking skills such as problem-solving and predicting
- act on their curiosity and take risks.

Children will develop positive learning dispositions.

Aim 3

Children will explore ideas and objects



Learning goals

In partnership with the adult, children will

- nake marks to record objects, events and ideas
- associate symbols (pictures, numbers, letters, and words) with the things they represent
- build awareness of the variety of symbols used to communicate, and use these
- express feelings and ideas through playing, talking, writing, music, and art
- use symbols to give and record information and to make sense of experiences
- nuse books and ICT for enjoyment and as a source of information.
